1. $\angle D O P T I O N$ OF THE AGENDA

The draft agenda was adopted.
2. MENBERSHIP QUESIIONS
a) Koblenz / Bundesarchiv - Filmarchiv

Mr Daudelin reported that he and "r Klaue bad had the proposed meeting with Mr Kahlenberg to clarily points relating to Article 3 (autonomy). He understands the position very well and will sumit a new application signed by himself, in time for it to be discussed at Madrid.

Mr Kuls mentioned that his om situation vas very similar and the difficulty was to get hold of documentation to prove their autonomy. He had arranged to send Dir Kahlenberg copy of the document that the Dominion Archivist of Canada provided for FIAF. Apparently the Dominion Archivist is a good colleague of the German nationcl archivist and they have already discussed the problem, at their own International Found Table on Archives.

In response to a question from Mr de Vaal, Mrs Orbanz confirmed that she wes of course in fevour of their membership and understood the probleas.

Decision: Next meeting.
b) Ubited Nations - Visual Naterials Iibrary

Wr Daudelin reported on the meeting he, Mr Klave and Mrs Bowser had with Mr Sydenhem. It was informative and friendly. He was eager to have some formal link with us even though nothing is foreseen in our Pules. He is very willing to pey to be some sort of informal observer, "a permanent guest": so he could be invited to congresses and receive publications, including the Bulletin. The problem was to decide the implications of setting a precedent.

Mrs Bowser mentioned that Visitors should be asked to pey to come to Congresses, and be suleject to annual approval.
Mr Francis agreed, and pointed out that the presence of extra people at Congresses made the whole event nore expensive for FIAF and the host. In response to a question from Mr Kula, it was stated that Observers pay 400 Sw.francs, only $1 / 7$ of the fee prid by Merbers ( 2850 Sw.francs).

Vr kiaue was concerned abcut the problems that might be created by setting a precedent, particularly vith reforence to Article 10 \% :

- normal Visitors need approvel of the local member, but should this apply to international organisation?
- if the Visitor pays the Observer rate, what happens about film exchanges? (UNO were not interested in film exchenges but other oreanisations might be).

Mrs Orbarz askea why it was necessary for ther to have a formal status: they could be invited to the Congress each year; subject to paying fhe fee, and they could buy the publications: then only the question of the Rulletin needed to be discussed.

Mr Kula felt it was imwortant for FIAF to know the specific status of all attending its congrosscs. Mayle we could find some non-membership status that would enable a seri-persanent link to bo nade and also generate revenue and promotion Por FIAF. Perhaps in the case of intcrnational organisations, the Exccutive Comittee shoula make the decisicns in the case of national organisations, the nntional member could decide. It was important far the fee to take into sccount the cost of the Congress and the additional burden for the host of hendling larger numbers perhaps thore should be senarate additionel charges for the specisl events and excursions.

Wr Francis suggested that as issociate was no longer used, perhaps this term could be aciopted, with specisl conditions being applied, provided they were epproved by the General lieeting.

Mr Cincotti felt that our present categories of membership were not satisfactory and he felt it might ba better to revert to 3 categories but refined as follows:

- Members
- Cendidate lembers i.s, organisations which, by their nature could hope to qualify in time as full Members.
- Observers j.ee. nstional or internetional organisetions which could never qualify as Members.

Mr Klaue agreec in principle but felt such a change would take naybe two years to implement perhaps a small eroup of $\bar{z}$ or 3 should stert examining the Statutes and Fules to see how one could let in other organisations, especiolly the archives of international bodies Meanwhile, there was the single casc of the UHO which neeved to be decided on soon. He felt the fee should be very close to the Observer fee, but siightly less to indicate the difference in status. The next decisision was to consider what categories of publicetions he shruld be antitled to:

- The Bulletin (up till now for internel distribution only),
- Reports of Commission work (generally for sele).
- Coministrative Zocuments produced by the Secretarist and not for gale: Book of Reports, Cuneral Meeting Ninutes, Project publications (some for sale).

Ior Kule sugeested one could ingtitute a subscription scheme for a given selection of gablications. He felt inutes should certainly be excluded.

Mrs Wibom agreed with Mr Kuls but opened up the wider issue of how tc handle visitors and vould-be visitors to Corgresses. It was at Mr de Pedro's visit to the Swodish archive that she had suggested to him me might find his questions enswered by attending the Mexies Congress. For the Stockholm Congress, she had alraedy s number of individuals from within and outside Sweden who were particulerly interested in the Symposium and wanted to attend: What should she say to them? how much can she charge?

Mr Cincotti was in favour of the widest possible diffusion of all our non-private publicetions.

Mr de Vaal recalled that it had been confirmed in Fapallo that the Bulletin would remain internal.

Mr Daudelin said the question of Visitors was covered by Article 27 but this Article did not toke into account the increased interest of the technical and historical symposie for outsidors. Decisions have to be made for each individual. as to whether they may be admitted to the General Meeting.

On the question of Mr de Pedro, Mr Daudelin expressed surprise that UNESCO had peid his trip to the Congress. Mr Cesenova said that Mr de Pedro had asked one of the interpreters et the symposium to translate some documents for him so that he could use then in Panama buti he had refused.

Shr Klaue iaentified 3 questions in the discussion to wish they had to find onswers and lor Borde geve his opinion on each as follows:

1) Possible change of stetutes:

As long as tivo was the only candidate, fef folt there was no need to emberk on this.
2) Decision on UNO:

He felt they should be welomed as "Subscribers".
3) Decision on Visitors to Congresses:

He felt they should be wolcomed provided they pay a fee for the General Meeting and the Eympesium.

Mrs Bowser agreen that we should not consider changing the statutes till we had more cendidates of similar categorics. She else felt ordin ay Visitors shouid pey fee for Congress costs.

Wr Cincotti ssked who the Congrass fee should be paid to the host or FIAF?
On the question of the possible change to Rules, Mr Klaue asked if it was the opinion of the meeting to weit? Mr Kule was not entirely heopy as if it was to take 2 years, that would be a long time to weit for would-be candidates. However, he felt the Subscriber idee would be a useful interim solution. Mr Proncis folt we should not make changes yet but, when we did, we should consider the 3 categories suggested by Mr Cincotti.

Mr Mane sumerised the leeling of the Meeting:

- No study group to consider chenges to the Rules for the moment but we should koep open tr various possibilities.
- For tho, charge fee for 'services' to include; Cormissica and Project publications, additiond general information but not the Bulletin, book of Reports or General Meeting Vinutes (General Meeting Vinutes include the closed session) plus getion to attend the Congress and Symposia.

Lix Casenova had a fuxther suggestion thet before each Congress:

- The Fixecutive Committee should aiscuss the list of Visitors to establish if sill may be admitted to the feneral weeting
- The General Moeting shou?d have a closed session initially to decide if all the Visitors may be sdritted. Individual members may have objections to Visitors that the Executive Comittee and others may not be aware of so it was inportant to give them this opmortumity for veto.

Mr. Francis noted thet this suggestion mise extra problems:

- The closed session was normally closed to Obsorvers, yet Observers should have the right to veto Visitors.
Although Observers were berred fron the closed session, they could read ebout it in the Minutes. (he had just learnt this from Mrs van der Mist).

Nr Kula was surprised even though he had been an Ohserver himselfo he surgested there should be separate rinutes for the closed session.
Mr. dives-inctio saw no reason why they should not get the closed session minutos, there were secrets, and in eny case you could heer everything from outsice if you wented. He felt that Onservers should be ellowed to attend but not to talk (unless specifically invited).

Mrs van der Elst reported thert had been cnly one exception to the Observers getting the full Minutes, i e, when Mr Ledoux made his big speech at Brighton. She asked again elout the Bulletin which she didn't think wes secret. She wes reminced by ir de Vasl that it was partly a question of cosyright end partly the foct that Excoutive Comittee decisions were reported in it.

Vr Klave recalled that of Rapallo we bad decided we shculd review the status of the Bulletin and this should therefore be discussed at the General Meeting in Stockholn.

Decision: Mr Daudelin to eraft lotter offering proposal to ino.
On the question of Visitors, Nr Kleue reed out firticle 27. He felt FIAF should be seekine to encourage attenance at ar activities:

- especiclly from countries where there vas as yet no member (e,e. Moz'ubique, Philiprines).
- relevent intemational nganisations ( 0.6 . FINT, ICA, IFLA, UNESCO) :
so in these cases there vas no country of crigin" member needing to give permission.

In the caseuf a country where no member exists but mily observers, he understood the resservation in Article 27 te apply only to the General Keeting. In his view, the Symposia should try to roach as wide an audience as possible.

Mr rancis felt there were two points to be careful thout.

- The Visitor shoula not have as many services or advantages as the Member (2y Cbserver who peil highen sukscriptions.
- We should be wary of overloedine ilie host and make it very cleax who is responsiklt for inviting the Visitors: FIAF (in which case they should help with the costs) or the Congross host.

Vw Gincotti felt that the apmoval reguired in Nrticle 27 only referred to attendance at the General westing. No-onc spould be able to veto pttendance at the Symporia; tis bost mist be fret ta chcose.

Mr Fuln supporied Mr Erancis view that one should be carerul not to let the Visitor havs all tile edvantages of the observer, at a cut price. The rain difference at the moment was the privileges regarding exchange of naterials which wes important.

He elsc mentionce the problems of overloading with Visitors so that there would not be enougly room in the opten fairly small auditoria available for sereenings.

Mr fives-Necto asked if it would be possible to lirit the number of times the same Visitor could ettend under the same status.

Mirs Vizom wes concerned with the very practical problems of determining who invited the visitor, what they should be charged, and whether the host had to bear the costs of their participation in all tho exents, especially the social ever: $s$; partios, geverment invitations, excussions, etc, where extra nombers could incresse costs significently (e.g. hire of transport, heals, etc).

Mr Borde felt that Irticle al should be strictly observed for the General Mecting but that the Syruresin should be open. He menticnod that Madame "althete Melies had asked if she was entitlea to go to the Genergl Meeting and he had certeinly rot beon consulted.

Mrs Bowser returnec to the question of who gets the Visitor's fee: for the sincle cccasion Visitor, she felt it was the host who hed the expense and who should thereiore set and get the fee.

Mrs van der Elst quetef her expcrience of otker intematicnal organisations Congresses. They hed severel categories of fees:

- the besic participation fes,
- the fee for hetel and stoying ensts
- separate fees for difforent aventa which were optional.

Mr Kleue proposed thet for Stockholm FIAF should invite the international orgnisations and they will be asked to pey a fue to be set by "rs Wibom? this fee will be fur sectition to the besic hatel/ments costs which they heve paid up till now.
FIFF may els invit: some developing countrice whe cennot pay their own wey but he felt it would be confusing for then to eft the general circular indicstind the pratieipation and hotcl fees. Ilowever, he felt some developins countries, e.g. Philippines, could wall pey their swn wey.
Ue Peit it was probably time te think about a hew set of Guidelines: decisions on whether visitors cen speak, how often they can attend withcut becoring observers, etc.
3. flves-Netto folt it would have to be very flexible as some Viaitors gere more importent then others; if they couldn't speak, we micht perhaps went them to maswer.

Mi Cosanova felt the Executive Comittee should havs some Recomendations for its ow use but there wuld be so meny possibilities that he thought it was importent for the Executive Committee to review the list of Visitors lofore each Coneress. Fcr Daxtepec, ho had reviewed the list with Mr Klaue.

Mr Francis agreed with this sugesestion. (He thought it could becone very important if people lite Dr Roals who didn't :corresent tny organisation 2resented themselves et our Congresses). He felt the Open Forum was the opportunity for the Visitors ta join in the oren discussion.

Wrs Orbanz wes not clear why they should not be silowed to speak when they had been invited and pai? their own way to sttend.

Mr Deucelin cited Examples:

- At Brighton, we had given the floor to the Intcrnational Filn Socicty but not expected thum to intervene otherwise.
- Deweomers to FIAF meetings, like Ne de Pedro, could intervene on every topic and talk for hours, totally disrupting the proceedings.

Decision: - Mr Kleue and Mrs Orben to draft sme Guidelines for Madrid.

- The Exfcutive Comaitece to rewiev the list of Visitors immeaiately before each Congress (not to roruse, but to identify and anticipate petentisl probleris).
c) \$is scellanecus

Mr Deuctelith esked the Executive Committee for formal recontirmation of the Observeres in Capacss and Koblenz which ho hod elready put before the General "ectireg as they wowe beth reprosentel, and he sulyitted their reports.

Fie mentioned thet the menbership reconfirmation Irceedures would be initiated lor Cttawe and the twe lioxicar archives, for consi-bration at Medrit.
3. commtssions
a) Preservetion Comission : Tirms of Reftrence

Mr Klaue sugrusted the Temas of Reference shoul be based on fir Schou's stetement to the Cenoral Mecting and his letter to the President, together with ideas which were mentioned in discussions, for example:

- Definition of techical crteg ries for describing holdings for possible PIAF Union List (visuel icuntilication, not cetaloguine aspects). (From Nr Francis).
- Specisl needs of archives in sevelopine countrics.
- Iist of concetent initrate Ioboratcries wnadwide. (From Mr Spehr).
- Fungus problems of film matcrinls. (Trom Nir Komiechner).
-Gidclines for tane holaings. (From Mrs Wibon),
Nas Wibon pointed out thet thore was a lifetine's programe and asked for Mr Schen's ideas on priorities, ciso on membership of the Comission.

Mr Schou relied as follows:

- Nembership

As there was such a brond and complex field to be covered and people's time wes limited, he envisaged regional sub-comissions, whos: heads would be the active monbers of the main Comission. He wants first to icertify how may pecple around the werld mifit be interested before being more specifice but he hoped that the large archives would operate as e Working Group, reporting on specific itens to the Commission.

## - Priorities

ifow thet the main theoretical works had Ween putished (Preservation and Restoration of Colour end Sound), he felt it wes important to review the rractical dide and produce User Manuals for use at the workbench.

Mr Kuls afd Mr Cincctti wented to know if tho ? unsuccessiful cendidstes were to be on the Comaission ond Tr Wlaue remorted thou he hod spoken to thom, they were willing, hut the decision rested with itr gchou, not the Executive Committee: Ju resperse to a question it wis confirmed that the mantion of 7 Nembers if the Sules wes a suge=stion not e requirement or Iimitation.
 felt that help on preservation in devslopint countrios wes degperately needec and hoped it would bo a priority.

Nor Francis asken whet should in ane about the tepe romual which Mr Volkmenn hed been working on, as it Was alreedy cut of date on the prectical side. Mr Kula agreed though loth thought the histoyicol section wes useful. FIAT कrme thinking of woxucing a Desic manual. Ic se-Iesi on tape hording practice ene it might te useful to pass the work on to them.

Decisions: - M. Kaue to formally thank provious mombers of the Comission Ior their work.

- fir Schou to ocntect possible nembors bepore the ond of 82 in roder te prepare and prosent propessls at Medrid for members of Combission and Sun-Comission.
- Mr Ghou te docise crate af first mevtine.
- Mr Klaue to mringe for "r Echcu te meet with Nr Volkmann for fomsil hendovex, including files whien he needs to keep or have sent to the Secreteriat (in secordance with the Guidelines on Comission Vork).
b) Documentation Conmission
lirs Bowser rozortad on the supporters' meeting es follows:
- mnurl Volume
is MoM is financing this for two years ond there lave been ne problems in rocouping their costs, they would like te ask FIfF to take cver the Hinamcing role next year. (born will finance TV Volumes),
- Pumlicity

They plan to asl sil members to pravidc informetion to help them extend their inter otionel meiling list.

- Budget.

This was epprovec but some expressed their concorn at rising eosts.
a) Caveloguine Comission

Mr Klaue asked Mrs Herrisch to rerort on the the projocts which wexe Biscussed the Beveral tacting:

- Infurmation marchive's Use of Computor Syntoms

Wke Iynskey wad volutcured the services of Levid fetsen fron Auptralio whe hed alreay atore a sinilar study fre fustmalia. The sugestion is that be should propere on new questionnsir and send it initially to Roger Smithen who had boen willing to do the project but could not start for mother yeex.

In response to o question frow lírs flerrissa, ing kuia polt it wuld be very useful to send it sle to FIAT, He felt it was important however not just simply to dssentle and pulish the results of the questionnaire: to be useful there was noed for some svaluation of the aifferent experiences.

Mr Trancis onveed and whdora incece if it woll be more ampopriate to produc a Eupplerent to the provious publicnticn which would draw attention to the important points that hes emerged with experience:

- the difficultion of ndopting smeone clse s systom,
- the mistakes,
- the inoritable miscelculations of the time required to plan and implement.

Mr सuls mentioned that the FAMP pulieations included not simply or anolysis at questionnaires but en expert's evaluation of the experiencca, net necessmily recomendations, fat paractical assessment.

Decision: Hos Howison/ir solven to check if Wr Wetson is competent to do such on melysis.

- Union List of Mon? irs' Eiclaincs

Mrs Harrison asken for acivice from the fixecutive Comittee on proprities nal erocedures:

## - Getaloguing Guideliness

They bod sonc ofreerent but nut ary "ificial" "ocunent yet; it was tmportant thict eny evertual union List should observe eny FIAF standsards.

- Hinimum Date

This could be worked out by teking a consensus of members through a questionnaire or ty the Cetaloguing \& Preservstion Comissions preparing a. Arast first.

- List of Nitrste Necatives

Wes this part of the same project or a aifferent one?

NB: Atent 10 minutes of the discussion is zut recosded on the tape at all so fClloving is mesca on brs ven Rer Elst ${ }^{7}$ s notez.

Wrs Bowser stressec thet one should flan for tho cotalogue ending up on a computer.

be encouraged to sarhange information, perheps bilntecratly, on what they
 rractical for mombrrs feimly quicicly, especislly if it vas encouraged by the Executita Gommittec.
irs Wibor asked if it would le use Sul to have a special virrlshop on Catialoguine st the Stockhol. Symosium. Mrs Iferrisch welcomed the idee but wondored hov $t$ organise it: would tho Juropean rombers of the Ceteloguing Commission bo stle to tho it.

Mr Klaue foit we should encourgse members te porticipate in bilaterel exchanges of in formetion en holdings anc thet the Fexcuti*o Comittee should recommend this as stey 1 towerds a Union Iist. For the nexi stage, which woula is much more fifficult, he felt wo shoule ha ready to discues at the next Gencral Meutives

Mn kule felt it wes e very embitious troject. He folt a very volualle task would be ta groe a standard to deserile or grade onc's own materjel in such Q way that it somid ke intermeted in othcr archives. This wes probably a task for the Preservetion Comissien but it would be very useful element of SUion Ifist.

Lecisicn: Mr Kluue to draft letter to members about bilateral exchenge and about Union Iist, and agree the text with Mr Frencis before distiribution.
4. ROLATINAS VITLL UNESCO - PROPOS:LS FOR R.A.M.D.

Mr Fileue said he hial mede compilation of the 30 proposels ance at the General Merting open Fomim, mior beadings (Trainines, Special Studies, btandards and Infomation Systems), but it had unforturately been misloia sc he couldn ${ }^{2} t$ present it. He whtel to present them to Unesco without waitirg for another meeting es they were duc to have a conference to review Rfle fairly soon.

Mr Kuls suggested there wis no neen for the Exoeutive Committee to discuss the proposils at this stege as no FIAF commitment was involved. If any were accepted, We could contract the work outside roboinine part of the fee as Sucervisors : this was common prectice in internatimal ureanisetions.

Decision: Mr Klaus to subnit list to linesco.
5. PROJFCIS UMDERWAN AND REW PROJECTE

The numbers below roier to the original list of rrojects provided for ofxtevec:
2) Catelogue of long silenti films (Indoux)

Mr Leucelin referred agein to the protlem of confidentiality because it emerger that many archives had not heer asked to contribute to the new edition: at first it was thought observers hed been excluded but it then energed in discussion thet several Mombers had not been sked either probebly those that had not beon sble to contribute to earlier editions,
There was much concer: on several issues:

- The purpose of tho project wes to increase the information available: it vas absurd therefore to exclude lorge collections like Bois a Arcy, Koblenz and Los figeles.
- If it was a FIAF project, then surcly all afiliates of IInF should both be invited to contribute and he able to receive copies whether or not they had silent films in their collections.

Decisions $T^{\prime} r$ lonar lin to advise Mr Ledous of the concern expressec at the lemerel looting by many whe hef not received the questionnaire wnd agk for clarification of his intentions, to enquire willether Mr Ledoux saw it as a FIAF project and therefore open to all; to romort bsck in Madrid meeting.
T) Prosreming in arclive cinenas (Ecrde)

Decision. Mr Borde to updetc ond pubiish in the Bulletin. Separate copies to be aveilable from the ecarctariat for potentiel subscribers" not ertitled to sec the Pulletin.
11) Trainjng of archivists (17aue)

Decision Mr Klaue to esk mumers to mention training possibilities and results of training in their Amusl Feports as well as meking formal reports on each trainec direct.ly in connection with this Froject.
13) Grestionnare on relaticns with Piln-schocls (Casanovs)

Decisjon: Mr Casanova and Mr Klnue to draft raport to CTLECT.

Nev Projects

Mr Klaue reviewed the nev icens that had veen raised in discussion:
a) 2,5 int Cetalogue

Decisicn: Francis to (GEL approvel from the authors taku manuscript to Brussels for costing session, advise Mrs Orbsnz for negotiations with possible sponsor, and report to Madrid mecting.
b) Bibliography of Iin litexsture in Snanish

Wr Kane asked for Giscussion es to whether this shouid be a FIAF project or remain e project of IJAN in essociation with the Spmaish-spenking archives. Wr Cascnova clarified what he had said at the previous meeting, namely that the project was to cover mything on the cinem (histry, techniques, etc) whici wes available in Spanish rugardless of who published or where it was published. Fit stressed thet he thoufht it was ingortant to have a FIAF projuct which wes concerned with somethine Sparisus.

Decision FTAF to send circular letter to 611 affiliateg (not just Spanissperking) together with wroject description, invitin; them to participate. (Drafted by ir Klaue and Mr Casanova). Adopted as FIAF project, responsibility af UNAM.
c) UNESCO-COURIER spec - I issue

We Datudin confimed that he tod had many olfers of assistance followine. the Open Forum discussion
from wh. Borde, Alves-Wetto, Casmova, Feter von Bagh de Val, Kuipex Pierre Veronnesu, Orbonz; Klnue Kula, Selou,
He will plsc seek helf from othene during the suramer and hoped that with contributions in by Sepoember 15, he would ve s.ble to deliven to Unesec by mid october.
a) irchive film in convilation

It emerged in discussion thet no-me was *am alesw about the intentions of this project and whather it would necessarily be useful to restrict the list to films made by crchives themsclves.

Decision: Nor Kleue to contact the Finnish Film Archive ficr clarification.
e) Custome problums

Nir Kleue reported thet the liad discussed the problctas experienced by the irgentines and thoueht it wes an individual problem, not a notential FIAF project.

Docision Mr Wlaise write o FTlP Ietter to the Argentinian Customs, also to those in wazil kesef on infomation provided by the netional erelivos.
i) Cotalogue of old arrergtus

Ir Francis suggested the first tesk wna to collect existing published cataIngues take a cmpiletion and then identify geps. He suggested a letter to mobers esking tor nemus and oddresses op ajl established collections in their countries so th-t the people mesponsible for the project could then contact than direci. Io felt privete collections should be excluded, certsinly initielly.

Decisionz Ifcas to be forvardec to Cinem theque Qucbecoise who will be reaponsibli for the project suggested by Piezre Veronneau.
g) Enchive qublications violiosrephy extension

Item 3 on Project Thdervey:
Dheision: Vor Kuls to araft critericn for inclusior of films: either co-productions with archives, usims archive metorial or about archjive work.
(iv.B. : Yould not this slso include compilations as in item 4?)
 ius Madrid when they had more time.
h) Statistics an archive holdines

He felt the statistics wcul? be very impressive as indicating the archives role in preserving intemational cultural heritefe and a very useful document for pubilic relations purposes.
i) Catogues of Tatin Americen Holdings

He saw this as A userul follow-up to the Iatin meticnn seminer, including holdings anywhere in the world by or about Letin fimerics.
j) I'TAF's own History
